In this psychological horror novel, Seattle author and Nebula Award winner Butler introduces us to an apparently young girl, suffering from amnesia, who has alarming needs and abilities. Some violence, explicit sex, and strong language. 2005.

Washington State, 1893.

Caroline Pruett loses her thoroughbred stallion King to cowhand Micah Sutton in a poker game. Caroline accidentally shoots Micah while stealing King back. Only slightly wounded, Micah sets out after Caroline to retrieve the horse, but Micah isn't the only one after King. Strong language and some violence. 2005.

The Alpine Kindred: #11, Emma Lord Mysteries BRW 1162

by Mary Daheim

Newspaper editor Emma Lord investigates the brutal stabbing of a pompous local philanthropist while rumors spread like wildfire through the old logging town of Alpine, Washington. 1998.

**Madison House: A Novel BRW

This novel chronicles turn-of-the-century Seattle's explosive transformation from frontier outpost to major metropolis. Maddie Ingram, owner of Madison House, and her quirky and endearing boarders find their lives inextricably linked when the city decides to regrade Denny Hill and the fate of Madison House hangs in the balance. 2005.

**Edge of Evil: #1, Alison Reynolds Mysteries

When a childhood friend recently diagnosed with ALS apparently commits suicide, former TV journalist Alison Reynolds launches an online blog as therapy. When threatening posts begin appearing, Ali realizes she might be in danger. Some violence. 2006.

Septuagenarian Margaret Hughes lives alone in a Seattle mansion with her collection of valuable antiques. Wanda Schultz, a young woman with a broken heart, has come west to find her wayward boyfriend. As the two women begin a tentative friendship, dark secrets emerge and barriers start to crumble. Winner of 2005 Washington State Book Award. 2004.

Fascinated with the character of Bertha, the madwoman in "Jane Eyre", Jean Rhys has imagined her as a carefree girl and an attractive young woman in the days before she came to England. Rhys creates a romantic, colorful, and thought-provoking past for this enigmatic woman. 1966.

Humor and a reality check are brought to the bitter gay-marriage debate by this polemical memoir. As the Seattle writer and his boyfriend, Terry, neared their 10th anniversary, Savage's mother put on the pressure for them to get married. Terry prefers tattoos as a sign of commitment and their six-year-old son declared that only men and women can get married. Strong language and some descriptions of sex. 2005.

Classic poetry book containing 12 poems reflecting the author's feelings about various colors. For grades 2-4. 1961.

Amelia Earhart: Pioneer in the Sky BRW 1212

Short biography of the woman who was the first pilot to make a trans-Atlantic flight, and who disappeared in her attempt to fly around the world. For grades 2-4. 1962.

Martin Luther King, Jr.: Man of Peace BRW 1228

by Lillie Patterson

Short biography of the minister, orator, and crusader for equal civil rights who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. For grades 3-6. 1969.

Give Me A Sign, Helen Keller! BRW 1208

by Peter Roop and Connie Roop

Chapter book biography describes interactions between Helen Keller and her teacher including their sign language breakthrough at the water pump. For grades 2-4. 2004.

Grasshopper Pie and Other Poems BRW 1218

Short poetry book with poems about a very special pie, an upside-down boy, a sneezing elephant, an encounter with a monster, and an alien who lands in a bowl of chicken soup. For grades K-3. 2004.

Begins by describing the U.S. electoral process and the duties of the office. Then offers 3 to 4 pages about each president including lists of biographical facts and significant events. The early part of George W. Bush's first term is covered. For grades 4-7. 2001.

The Spice of America BRW 1226
by June Swanson

Traces the little-known origins of such American phenomena as the doughnut, Mary's little lamb, the beaver hat, the Ferris wheel, the Raggedy Ann doll, and denim jeans. For grades 3-6. 1983.

The Calico Mother Goose Book of Earth, Moon, and Sky BRW 1204

edited by Wendy Wax
Short book of Mother Goose rhymes that feature various aspects of nature. Double-line spaced braille. For grades P-2. 1989.

Meet John F. Kennedy
BRW 1221

by Nancy Bean White
A biography of John F. Kennedy for young readers, highlighting the early years, family relationships, and accomplishments of the 35th American president. For grades 3-6. 1993.

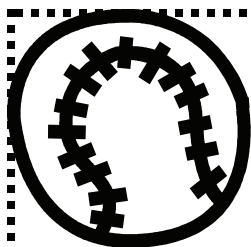
